Early Hoover's Farm Dairy

As I sit down on this bitter, cold wintry day in 2025 to write the early Hoover history, I can't help but wish that George Hoover had chosen a warmer climate to purchase property but then I know that Sanborn was the perfect place. All family members to this day have worked on the farm at one time or another. Once labor intensive, new equipment makes it easier. But the hours are longer than ever.

George Hoover was born on December 10, 1812 in Seneca County, and at age two he moved to Yates County with his parents. After he married Sarah Zacharius of Royalton in 1835, they moved to an area known as the Bear Swamp where they raised their family of two sons and three daughters. At age 65 he sold the farm he had owned in the Town of East Amherst, and in 1871 he bought property on Hoover Road where he made his life until his death at age 76 on June 16, 1988. His obituary noted that he joined the Mennonite Church about 1840 at 28 years old. He was one who took part in moving the church, which is now on the Sanborn Area Historical Society property, from Pekin to Sanborn on logs pulled by teams of horses.

His oldest son, Lyman, settled on the farm later known as the Frank Farm south of the main house on Hoover Road. Lyman married Mary Reigle from Pekin, and they had a daughter, Ada, and two sons, Melvin and Harold. Lyman died at age 59 and his two sons passed away at the young ages of 33 and 47 while his wife lived to age 76. George's daughters, Julia and Barbara, bought the farm later known as the Dean Farm on the opposite side of the road toward Sanborn. Their third daughter, Matilda in ill health, died at age 36.

Dennis was given the farm where the Hoover family homestead still stands today. Dennis and Anna Wagner from LaSalle met at a party in the Hoover home and discovered that both their families came from Switzerland. They married in October 1886 and welcomed three children, Frances, Gertrude and Edwin.

George and Sarah settled on a farm across the street from Lyman where Sarah, referred to as Sally, passed away at age 72 in 1882 and George six years later. From that time to this day in 2025 there were always at least four Hoover families living on Hoover Road.

Edwin and his wife Lucille started Hoover's Dairy in 1920 when his sister, Gertrude Kline, asked if he could deliver milk to their house for their first child, Wesley. The rest is history!
